Space at Stevenson

- Meeting the needs of our current student population
 - What are those needs?
 - Requiring more small group ESL, NJTSS/RTI (8), Special Education, Speech, OT, PT
 - Special area teachers are working in classrooms on a cart.
- Proactively planning to maintain proper learning spaces
 - To optimize learning
 - Building a strong foundation, support system at Stevenson
 - Setting them up for success for Churchill and beyond

Space Utilization at Churchill

- All full sized classrooms are used for full homeroom classes
 - When homerooms are in special areas, the special area teachers use the homeroom classrooms. This displaces the homeroom teacher during his/her planning period. It creates issues with regard to setting up hands-on activities and/or experiments. Additionally, it makes it difficult to reach out to parents because there is not private location to make calls.
- The former stage in the old gym/cafeteria functions as a "band room".
 - Lessons and rehearsals run concurrently with lunch/recess periods on most days.
- Health classes are taught in the gym or cafeteria on most days because there are no classrooms available. Students sit on the floor for the period.
- Special Area Classes are on a cart and move from room to room.

Space Utilization at Churchill

• All small group instruction (SGI) rooms are used for SGI. Additionally, many of the offices in the building are used as instructional spaces for SGI as well.

Space Utilization at Churchill

- The Art Room is used for Art classes in the morning and as an instructional space all afternoon.
- The Media Center is used for Media classes in the morning and as an instructional space all afternoon.
- The cafeteria is used as an instructional space in the morning and after lunch periods.
- Rooms 7, 9, 10, 16A, 17, 18, 20, 21, 24A, and the gym are all shared spaces with at least two teachers using the space on a daily basis.
- Additionally, all homeroom classrooms are used by special area teachers for their class periods.

- Expanding school sizes (referendum)

- Moving Pre-K off-site
- Increase class sizes
- Reconfiguration of Grade Levels per building

Historical Grade Level Configurations in Fairfield

- Churchill K-6 as part of the Caldwell Township School District
- Both schools K-6
- Stevenson K-6 and Churchill 1-5
- Stevenson K-4 and Churchill 5-6
- Stevenson P-3 and Churchill 4-6
- Stevenson P-2 and Churchill 3-6 (new)

Benefits of Moving Grade 3 to Churchill

- More equitable enrollment for each building
 - This keeps administrative costs down by avoiding the need for assistant principal.
- Keep the buildings equalized in enrollment. Current enrollment for Stevenson is 424 students and Churchill 290. We will lose 120 6th Grade students. If we keep the current configuration, Stevenson will continue to have approximately 430 and Churchill 260. Moving Third grade will put Stevenson at about 345 and Churchill at about 368. The numbers depend on K enrollment and the number of new students who enroll vs. students who leave.

- Preschool provides the district the opportunity for more effective and efficient early intervention. This enables us to better target the instruction at the P-2 level, thereby reducing the need for services in grades 3-6.
- Frees up space at Stevenson to allow for preschool.
- When children of early childhood age, PreK-2, are grouped together in educational settings, there can be more of specific focus on the developmental needs of this age level, which are different than those of children in grades 3-6.

- NJ Student Learning Standards are written in bands, K-2, 3-5, and 6-8.
 - Grade level vertical articulation within bands will be improved

LANGUAGE ARTS

- K 2:DRA, Raz-kids, Fundations, Guided Reading*, modeled/mentor text curriculum
- 3 6:Lexile, Achieve3000, TI/DI periods, novel-based curriculum
- All tested grade levels will be in the same building, allowing for more efficient and effective scheduling and less impact on non-tested grades.

- Upper elementary teachers are more like-minded with regard to rigor, which necessitates vertical articulation. Much more difficult in separate buildings.
- Homework amount increases in Grade 3 and is more aligned with Grade 4.

- School routines, assemblies and activities can be more grade and age focused. For example, students in grades PreK-2 will not have schedules and routines interrupted during the administration of Grade 3 state testing.
- Parent involvement opportunities can focus more specifically on the developmental stages of the students in each building (PreK-2 or 3-5).
- School staff is able to focus on one specific developmental stage of children's educational growth.
- Professional Development can be more focused on the educational needs of a specific developmental stage (PreK-2 or 3-5).

Plan for 3rd Grade at Churchill

- Grade 3 moves into the hallway currently occupied by the 5th Grade.
- Grade 5 compacts from 5 sections to 4 sections due to smaller overall grade level size (80), and moves out to trailers. Trailers will have their own bathrooms. Security Officer will be present during transitions in and out of building.
- Grade 3 and 4 will use the 4th Grade Bathrooms. Grade 6 will only use the bathrooms in the 6th Grade wing bathrooms. Grade 5 will use the bathrooms in the trailers.

Plan for 3rd Grade at Churchill

- Grade 3 teachers will walk their students to Physical Education classes, Art and Media.
- Recess will be constructed to avoid any 3/6 crossover
- Assigned bus seating for 3rd and 4th graders in the front of the bus.
- Morning bus drop-off is monitored by staff in the gym.
- Parent drop-off: Grades 3 and 4 enter through the front of the building, Grades 5 and 6 enter through the rear doors.

Lunch Periods with Grade 3

- Grade 3 will eat lunch at 11:42am, then go to recess.
- Grade 4 will go to recess at 11:42am, then come inside for lunch.
- Grade 5 will eat lunch at 12:28pm, then go to recess.
- Grade 6 will go to recess at 12:28pm, then come inside for lunch.
